GES PAC Meeting

Nov. 12, 2019 7 p.m.

1. Agenda adopted as amended to include discussion and vote on PAC budget: Lorena Ruth first, Sandra Squires second. None opposed.

2. Guest speaker: Patrick Bocking, superintendent spoke on the school district's new strategic plan and new website.

- Values in the strategic plan include affirmation of indigenous communities, inclusion, equity, innovation, respect.
- It also includes the goal that students' voices will be heard and acted upon.
- Other emphases in the plan include literacy, numeracy, mental health, care of the planet (this is new in this plan), digital literacy, and having students graduate with life skills to navigate personal future directions. The board is also working on an environmental education action plan.

There was also a walk through of the new district website and new school website. One of the new features includes a calendar that parents can subscribe to electronically. Schools registration and forms are increasingly moving online.

- 3. Open mic. There were no topics raised.
- 4. Teacher/staff grant presentations.
 - There were two applications. One was to help fund recycling towers in each classroom to help kids get in the habit of recycling. It helps kids learn to separate types of recycling. Kids who are part of the recycling/sustainability club will be handling the towers and getting them out for pick up. In response to questions, we heard there would be no added costs for pick up. It will also cut down on garbage generated by the school.
 - Library audio books and ebooks. Currently we do not have any in the school library. This is a pilot project that would try out a few titles to see if they help get kids interested in reading. There were questions about how books will be selected and if more than one kid can sign out at one time (probably not.) As part of the project, kids will get education about how to use and sign out ebooks.
- 5. Budget presentation.
 - Treasurer Debbie Small presented the annual budget as attached. Most of the budget items are the same as last year and have been conservatively estimated. A new \$1,500 for teacher/staff grants was included as a new item this year. The total budget for this year is \$18,530.
 - Our main sources of income are the government gaming grant, Halloween Carnival fundraiser, school store hot lunch program. We also raise smaller amounts through Amazon, use of IGA cards and smaller fundraisers throughout the year.
 - Some of the programs supported by PAC include the breakfast program before school, Family First program to help school families in need, intermediate skating, primary swimming lessons, breakfast with Santa, reeds for the music program, reading and math support (special after school events), community sandwich program, sports day, Tween club, Young Writers Conference, parent education and amounts for teachers to supplement classroom resources.

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Motion: That the budget be approved as presented. First: Carly Westmoreland. Second: Sandra Squires. None opposed. Motion passed to approve budget.

6. Reports.

a.) DPAC Report: Lorena Ruth

- There was a DPAC meeting Oct. 24. Kerry Mahlman came to talk about Indigenous education. She is available to come to PAC meetings. There was discussion of inviting her to come and talk in the spring, along with Gus Guzek, GES indigenous educator.
- There was also discussion of the local healthy schools committee which works with Children's Hospital on addressing issues like mental health and substance abuse.

b.) Principal's Report: Deborah Luporini -see Principal's Report for Nov. 12

- Public health nurses talked to staff. There are 11 students at GES who carry Epipens. Teachers need to know what to do even if the students may not be in their classrooms.
- Foundations Skills Assessment has wrapped up.
- Student band, choir and reader at Remembrance Day were impressive.
- Report cards go home Nov. 22 with parent teacher interviews to follow. Scholastic book fair is happening that week.
- Skating for intermediate students is taking place over several days this year to space out crowds and ensure there are enough skates.
- A dance workshop for students is being put on by Paul Silveria.
- A parent workshop on vaping by Dr. Milan Khara will be presented at Chaletech on Dec. 9 7 p.m.
- A group of Grade 6&7 students applied and were selected to attend We Day in Vancouver, which is happening Nov. 19. The school district sends about 100 students in total.
- Breakfast with Santa is happening Dec. 18
- c.) Treasurers Report: Deb Small -see Gibsons Elementary PAC Account Banking as of Nov. 12, 2019
 - We made \$4,277 on the Halloween Carnival this year, which is similar to last year.

 - We received two applications: the recycling club applied for \$1,200 and librarian applied for \$500 for ebooks. There was discussion about what our general guidelines and policies should be and whether other PACs do this. We will ask DPAC to help out with this. Sandra will follow up and there will be a possible discussion in the new year. Martial will also seek input from BCCPAC.
 - There was discussion of the two proposals.
